Glenn got leases on a large tract Indian Territory and carried it until it was necessary to raise more Then Barnsdall went into deal to the extent, it is said, of \$15,000,000.

T. N. Barnsdall, at Pittsburg to-night, refused to discuss the reported sale.

"I have nothing to do with reports that may have reached the newspapers," was his only comment.
